Foxglove, Digitalis purpurea



Identification: Big, upright biennial; up to 12 feet tall. Large softly-hairy lower leaves with toothed edges, growing alternately and getting progressively smaller up the stem. Pink-purple or white tube flowers with paler lower side and dark spots within in 1-sided raceme.

Habitat: Roadsides, fields and pastures, forest edges,

logged areas.

Animals Affected: All livestock.

Toxin Family: Cardiac glycosides.

Other: Causes abdominal pain (colic) and diarrhea as

well as cardiac arrhythmias and heart block.

Not usually eaten. Eaten if other food is scarce and poisoned animals may develop a craving. Highly

poisonous in hay.
